AUTHORIZED ENTITY - DEFINITION

Marrakesh Treaty defines AE as:

- Entity authorized or recognized by government to provide education, instructional training, adaptive reading or information access to 'beneficiary persons' on a non-profit basis.
- Also includes government institutions or non-profit organizations that provide same services to beneficiary persons.
- Treaty does not prescribe approval process to qualify as Authorized Entity. Organization simply has to meet these criteria.

AUTHORIZED ENTITY - DUTIES

- Serving VIP as "primary activities" or institutional obligations;
- verify conditions for being a beneficiary
- limit distribution to them
- discourage unauthorized uses
- maintain due care and keep records.

What is required in national law?

- Countries must provide in domestic copyright law for a limitation or exception to the
 right to reproduce published works in alternative formats, make them available to persons
 with print disabilities, and allow for export and import of accessible format copies.
- Such limitation or exception in national copyright law may allow that Authorized Entities are permitted to:
 - produce these accessible format copies without the authorization of the rights holder
 - obtain accessible format copies from another Authorized Entity and
 - *supply* those copies to beneficiary persons by any means

Role for AEs in support of national ratification

Advocacy with lawmakers – Sample of successful approach

- *Understand* current domestic law provisions and provisions of Treaty what needs to change.
- Engage with consumer organizations interested in advocating with government on their own behalf.
- *Promote* Treaty aspiration to help end the 'global book famine' worldwide for people with print disabilities with national government policy advisors and legislators.
- Explain how print-disabled citizens and print-disabled community worldwide will benefit from national copyright law aligned with Treaty principles.
- Provide input to draft legislation, if requested.

Role for AEs in implementing Treaty provisions (1)

Once Treaty ratified by the country and instruments of ratification deposited with WIPO, **AE positioned to implement** Treaty provisions in support of its goal

- Consider whether need for further government involvement to ensure the goal of the Treaty is advanced nationally.
- Produce and deliver published works in accessible formats to support education, employment, leisure reading and full social inclusion of persons with print disabilities.
- Consider options to facilitate exchange of accessible formats with other AEs worldwide.
- Determine with whom to exchange accessible formats to enhance ability to support reading needs of your print-disabled community.

Role for AEs in implementing Treaty provisions (2)

- Provide holistic solution of Kit, Content and Confidence by:
- Ensure Availability of content required by the beneficiaries in language and format of their choice.
- Building basic library infrastructure to bring in efficiency and accountability in delivering content to beneficiaries.
- Ensure availability of digital book reading device in affordable cost, compatible with local language and connected to the library. such as:
 - Smart Phone or Computer with Screen Reading software
 - DAISY book player
 - Refreshable Braille Display
- Provide training to beneficiaries.
- Work with research organisations and industry to fill technology gaps in delivering Kit,
 Content and Confidence to beneficiaries.

EXAMPLE FROM INDIA

- DAISY FORUM OF INDIA: A network of 164 government and nongovernment organisations, public libraries, educational institutions supported by research organisations, industry partners and international organisations.
- Worked with government of India to amend the copy-right law to introduce exceptions for production of accessible format books.
- India became first country to ratify the Marrakesh Treaty.
- Launch of Multi-agency combine Online library with 320000 titles; 26000 members and growing.
- Screen reading software and daisy player released in high quality seven Indian languages and covered all Indian languages through e-speak.
- Worked with IIT and Industry to produce affordable Refreshable Braille Display compatible with Indian languages.
- About 20000 daisy player/android devices provided free of cost to beneficiaries by Government of India.
- Provides training to beneficiaries: (3 month computer training / 3 day smart phone training / 7 days training for refreshable braille display)
- Holds Meetings and seminars for orientation, awareness and acceptability.
- Collaboration with Central and State Text Book Boards to adopt inclusive publishing policy and work flow.
- Provides accessible book production training to publishers and VI organisations in collaboration with DAISY Consortium.
- Building capacity in braille presses to use available accessible digital books from publishers and online library.
