

Knowledge-based,info rmation-technology-drivenindustries, suchasthesoftwareand entertainmentindustries, have en joyed spectacular growth. Electronic commerce — analmost unknown phenomenon some five or six years ago — now spansal continents, and has redefined the wayw edobusiness, opening upmarkets and opportunities for both buyers and

sellers.Itisestimatedthattherevenuefrome -commercewillreach500billiondollarsinthe nextfewyears.

Today,inthedawnofthenewcenturywecansaythatitwillbethec enturyofknowledgeand theintellectualcapital.

The classical industrials ociety is being increasingly replaced by an ewknowledge -based economy where ideas and innovation, rather than landor natural resources, have become the main source of economic of rowth and competitive advantage for companies or nations. However, ideas have no value until they are converted into tangible things. Things do not happen. They are made by humans. In this context in tellectual property seems more and more relevant to every aspect of our life.

Manycountrieshaverealizedthattheirpeopleareamongtheirmostpreciousassets, with creative and innovative ideas, and governments and policy makers are advised to explore the possibilities of creating abusiness and economic environment in which such creativity and innovation can flour is hand develop.

Asintellectual property has become a key tool for wealth creation, its protection has taken on an even greater significance.

Theeffectivenessoftheintellectualpropertypr otectionsystemdependsonabroad -based understandingofthesystemanditsadvantages. Insuchanenvironment, creativity will flourish and the importance and relevance of intellectual property rights in keypolicy spheres such a strade, health, investm ent, environment, foods a fety, biotechnology, scientificand technological advancement, culture and heritage, and folklore, will be fully recognized.

Thedynamicsoftoday's technological environmentare challenging the intellectual property system on many fronts. On the one hand, the system is responding to the demands made on it by the new economy and on the other, it is actively seeking to address the concerns and needs arising from new and emerging in tellectual property is sues, such a straditional knowledge, biotechnology, and genetic resources.

Inanagewhenideascommandimmensevalues, it is not surprising that the ownership rights in those ideas have become a matter of intense policy debate and legal argument, and also competitive bidding by the business community.

Manyeconomicstudiessuggestthatstrongprotectionofintellectualpropertyrightsisamong themosteffectivemeansofpromotinginnovation,knowledgesharingandoveralleconomic growth.Butassomeexpertssuggestwecannotensur ehigherprotectiontodayonlybyway ofraisingthestandardsofprotection.Thereisobviouslyalimittothis.Weshould,perhaps, lookintootherwaysandmeansofgeneratinggrowththroughintellectualpropertyrights. Takingintoaccountthestate ofaffairstodayandthefactthattheexistingsystemof protectionmaynotbeentirelyfitforthefuture,weshouldencouragenotonlythevertical developmentofthesystem,butalsoitswidening.

Takingintoaccountthatgrowthinmanycountriesis related to the dynamic development of the small and medium -sized enterprises, as a backbone of their economies, the Intellectual Property systems hould be made more accessible for SMEs and some activities could be undertakent othis end.

Ihavetoadmitthat,inthelast50 -60years,despiteBulgaria'swellknowntalentandgifts, intellectualpropertyprotectionwassomewhatneglected.Inrecentyears,however,allserious institutionsandpoliticianshavebeenawarethatincountriessuchasBulgaria,withits considerablescientific andtechnicalpotential,andayouthknownforitsadaptabilitytothe contemporaryaspectsofthecomputerrevolution,intellectualpropertyprotectionmay becomeanimportantprerequisiteforBulgaria'ssuccess.Theintellectualenergyoftheyoung Bulgariansshouldbechanneledintopubliclyusefullawfulactivities,whichwillbenefitboth theauthorsofideasandsocietyasawhole;thebenefitwillalsogotothewholeworldandall ourfriends,whohaverecognizedthat,inthepastfewyears,Bulga ria,asacountry,has managedtocopewithaproblemthatisbecomingincreasinglyimportant.

Astutemindshaverealizedearlyenoughthatideasaremorevaluablethanmoney. Yet, the roadleadingfromideastomoneyofteninvolvesquitecomplicatedtra nsformations and, to ensure that such transition is brought about successfully, the ideas have to be protected in one way or another. Bulgariahasbeenamemberofthe World Intellectual Property Organization and its predecessors since 1921. Toda yith a sjoined the WIPO Performances and Phonograms Treaty and the WIPO Copyright Treaty, known as the Internet Treaty. The Bulgarian Parliamenthas also ratified, in one of its last sessions, the Protocol to the Madrid Agreement for the International Registration of Marks.

We have had an excellent cooperation with the World Intellectual Property Organization and I ampleased that Sofia was selected as the venue of its International Conference that will discuss is sue sof vital importance for the intellectual property system and challenges that will have to be addressed as early as possible if we wish to keep a breast of the dynamic developments.

Beforeconcluding, Iwould like to share with you somethoughts from a slightly different perspective. Aperspective from which not just the modern technologies but also the modern perceptions of the world and its future should be influencing the policy -making process. This point of view acquires special relevance within the context of the political developments we have been witnessing we sto fhere.

HoweveraftertheSecondWorldWarandespecially today,inthedawnofthenewcentury, wecanreassess conventional values. Things have been changing since the intellectual productandtheideahavebeengivenprimeimportance. Thehumanindividualis nodoubtin thefocusofcontemporarypolitics.T oday, self-esteemandeventhesense of national pride is nolongerdetermined by the size of the national territory, or the country's resources, or the strengthofitsarmedforces. Then at ional self -confidencetodaydependsonthestandardand qualityo flife, the unique chance to have access to new ideas circulating around the world, the possibilitytomovearoundandseekemploymentwhereonefeelsbest. Had the old national ideal, based on territory, natural resources and army been still valid, then just15 years ago the citizensoftheformerSovietUnionshouldhaverankedfirstintermsofnationalpride.For theycertainlylivedinthelargestcountry, therichestinnatural resources and with the biggest army.Bythesametokenthecitizensof Luxembourg, Belgium, or Singaporeshould have sufferedfromachronicdeficiencyofnationalpride.
