WhereastheParisConvention ,signedin1883,isacceptedasafirmbasisforpractically allexistingpatentlaw,thedebateoverwhetherpatentrightspromoteorinhibitthe developmentoftechnologycontinuestothisday. Changesinlegislation,enforcementandthe developmentof technologyhavehadanimpactonexistingintellectualpropertyrights systems,andthathasledtoanincreasingneedfortheglobalprotectionofinnovationsand inventionssupportedbyasound,predictableandsmooth -runninglegalsystem. Thepatent andinnovationsystemisthereforefacingtremendouschallenges.

Wearemovingtowardsa"mobileinformationsociety,"inwhichpeoplecanconnect witheachotherandaccessinformationwheneverandfromwherevertheylike. Thathas resultedinmoreand moresoftwarebeingincludedinthehardwareandinthechallengeof findingwaystopatentsoftware. The TRIPS Agreementis as olution to that problem, as it provides that no category of inventions may be excluded from patent protection perse . We are seeing many countries amend their legislation to bring it in line with TRIPS.

Inthetelecommunicationsfieldweseeanever -acceleratingracetowardsnew standards. This has meant a tremendous increase in the number of patents and costs.

Companies can combat these costs by granting licenses or by looking a tways of reducing expenditure without giving upreasonable protection, or both. Nokiais in favor of open standards, and is strongly committed to following the intellectual property rightspolicies of the European Telecommunications Standards Institute (ETSI) and other standard zing bodies.

ItisoftenincorrectlyassumedthatallinformationavailableontheInternetisfreefor everyoneandcanbeusedforanypurposeatall.Legislatorsneedsto developasystemthat takesintoaccounttheinterestsofusers,contentprovidersandserviceprovidersinabalanced andfairway.Todealwithwrongdoersthereisaneedtoestablishsomeinternationalcourtor othersystemthatwouldhavejurisdictio noverInternetoffensesregardlessofwheretheyare actuallycommitted.

The mobile information society is a global society. Accordingly, there is an eed to protect inventions globally and at reasonable cost. With that in mind, we should all warmly welcome the European Commissions's proposal for a new Community Patent.

Toadvancethegrandercauses, suchasthedevelopmentofinnovative products and solutions for themobile information society, as mall part of national decision -making might have to be surrendered, and by all parties a like. This could among other thing sinclude agreeing to just one language for the global processing of patents and to the idea of internationally harmonized procedures of sufficients ophistication, with appropriate appears systems, with which to handle infringement and invalidity is sues.
