NEW PCT CONTRACTING STATE

Morocco (country code: MA)

On 8 July 1999, Morocco deposited its instrument of accession to the PCT, and on 8 October 1999, will become bound by the PCT. Consequently, in any international application filed on or after 8 October 1999, Morocco may be designated and, because it will be bound by Chapter II of the PCT, may also be elected. Furthermore, nationals and residents of Morocco will be entitled from 8 October 1999 to file international applications under the PCT.

SIERRA LEONE: FURTHER INFORMATION ON DESIGNATIONS FOR AN ARIPO PATENT

Further to the accession of Sierra Leone to the Harare Protocol within the framework of the African Regional Industrial Property Organization (ARIPO) (see PCT Newsletter No. 05/1999), all international applications whose international filing date is on or after 25 February 1999 and which contain a designation for an ARIPO patent ("AP") expressed so as to include any State which is a Contracting State of the Harare Protocol and of the PCT are considered to include the designation of Sierra Leone ("SL") for the purposes of obtaining an ARIPO patent. It should be noted that, even where that fact is not reflected in the Notification of receipt of record copy (Form PCT/IB/301),

the records of the International Bureau will be modified accordingly and the international applications concerned, when published in the form of pamphlets and in the *PCT Gazette*, will include that designation. *No action is required on the part of applicants.*

BUDAPEST TREATY ACCESSION

Romania

PCT STATISTICS

1 January to 30 June 1999

During the first six months of 1999, the International Bureau of WIPO received 36,097 international applications filed with PCT receiving Offices worldwide, representing an increase of 7.8% over the same period in 1998.

Of those 36,097 international applications filed, 2,488 (6.9%) were filed using the PCT-EASY software; as many as 30.5% of those 2,488 applications originated from applicants from Japan. As PCT users are becoming more aware of the benefits of using the PCT-EASY software, the share of PCT-EASY filings is showing a steady increase—during the month of June, such filings accounted for 12.9% of all international applications filed.

The number of demands for international preliminary examination filed under Chapter II during the same period amounted to 26,836, representing an increase of 10.9% over the same period last year.

MOST FREQUENT PCT USERS IN 1998

In 1998, 269 PCT applicants accounted for 34.9% (20,884) of the 59,597 international applications published, each with 25 or more such applications. Of these 269 applicants (in general, the first-named applicants in the applications concerned), 49.4% were from the United States of America, 14.9% from Japan, and 12.3% from Germany. There were 44 applicants in each of whose names more than 100 international applications were published. The largest PCT user in 1998 was Siemens Aktiengesellschaft, with 1,061 international applications published that year.

PRACTICAL ADVICE

Withdrawal of designations

Q: I am the agent for a company which is the applicant, together with two applicant/inventors, for an international application in which eight PCT Contracting States have been designated (the applicant/inventors are indicated as applicants for the purposes of the US designation only). The company has decided to restrict the number of States designated in the application by withdrawing the designations of three States, including that of the US. Could you explain the procedure for doing this, and tell me whether any fee is payable? Will I be entitled to a refund of those three designation fees, which have already been paid?

A: You may withdraw the designation of any State by way of a notice of withdrawal, preferably addressed to the International Bureau, provided that the notice is received before the expiration of 20 months from the priority date or, where PCT Article 39(1) applies in respect of the States concerned, prior to the expiration of 30 months from the priority date (see below). If you send the notice of withdrawal to the receiving Office (which you have the option to do under PCT Rule 90bis.2(d)), that Office will mark the date of receipt on the notice and will transmit it to the International Bureau; the notice will be considered to have been submitted to the International Bureau on the date marked.

Although you have the option to send the notice of withdrawal to the receiving Office, or, where PCT Article 39(1) applies, to the International Preliminary Examining Authority (IPEA), it is strongly recommended that any such notices of withdrawal be sent direct to the International Bureau. This is particularly important if the date of completion of technical preparations for international publication of the international application is close, since, in order to prevent the publication of the designations concerned, the notice of withdrawal must reach the International Bureau before those technical preparations have been completed (which is generally by the 15th day prior to the date of publication) (PCT Rule 90bis.2(e)). Sending the notice of withdrawal direct to the International Bureau will also ensure that the designated Offices concerned will be

informed of the withdrawal of the designations as soon as possible.

If you wish to withdraw the designation of a State which has been designated for the purposes of both a national and a regional patent, you should make it clear which of the designations is intended to be withdrawn. If there is no such clarification, the withdrawal of the designation of that State will be taken to mean the withdrawal only of the designation for the purpose of obtaining a national patent (see PCT Rule 90*bis*.2(b)).

The notice of withdrawal must be signed by all the applicants, including the applicant/inventors. If you have been appointed as agent by all the applicants, you may sign the notice on their behalf. No fee is payable for the withdrawal of designations (as is the case also for the withdrawal of priority claims or of the international application), but you will not be entitled to any refund of designation fees.

Since the applicant/inventors are applicants for the designation of the US only, and the designation of US is to be withdrawn, they will no longer be applicants for any of the designated States. You should therefore, submit, preferably together with the notice of withdrawal, a replacement first sheet of the request indicating the remaining applicant company as the only applicant (for all designated States) and indicating each of the former applicants for the US no longer as "applicant and inventor," but as "inventor only." If you fail to do this, however, it will not be considered as a defect in the application, and the request will be corrected ex officio by the receiving Office or by the International Bureau; whichever authority makes the correction will notify the other and the applicant accordingly. Note that you should not send a replacement second sheet of the request indicating the new status of designations—this will be corrected ex officio by the authority concerned.

Upon receipt of the notice of withdrawal, a confirmation of the withdrawal, including the date of receipt of the notice by the authority concerned, will be sent by the International Bureau to you, and to the designated Offices affected by the withdrawal if they have already been notified of their designation (*Administrative Instructions under the PCT*, Section 415(a)). You did not indicate whether you have filed a demand for international preliminary examination, but note that, if you filed a demand before the expiration of 19 months from the priority date and the designated States that you now wish to withdraw were elected, the elections concerned may be withdrawn by way of a notice of withdrawal of those elections, preferably addressed to the International Bureau, provided that the notice is received before the expiration of 30 months from the priority date. If you submit the notice of withdrawal to the IPEA, that Authority will mark the date of receipt of the notice and transmit if to the International Bureau. The notice will be considered to have been submitted to the International Bureau on the date marked.

It is important to note, however, that if elections are withdrawn after the expiration of the time limit under PCT Article 22 for entry into the national phase, the withdrawal will be treated in each of the elected States concerned as a withdrawal of the international application for that State unless the national phase has already started in that State. If the withdrawal is effected before the expiration of that time limit, the international application will not be considered withdrawn in respect of the States concerned, but if the applicant fails to perform the acts referred to in PCT Article 22 within the applicable time limit, the effect of the international application will cease in those States with the same consequences as the withdrawal of any national application in those States (PCT Article 24(1)).

In any designated or elected Office where the processing or examination of the international application has already started under PCT Article 23(2) or 40(2), the withdrawal of the designation or election will have no effect (see PCT Rule 90*bis*.6(a)).

For further details on the withdrawal of designations and elections, see *PCT Applicant's Guide*, Vol. I/A, paras. 454–459 and paras. 462–3, respectively.

FORM RELATING TO ENTRY INTO THE REGIONAL PHASE BEFORE THE EUROPEAN PATENT OFFICE

If, in respect of an international application in which EP has been designated, the European Patent Office (EPO) has not received the fees payable for entry into the regional phase by the expiration of 21 months from the priority date, the practice of the EPO is to send out EPO Form 1217. This form is a communication pursuant to EPC Rule 85a(1) reminding the applicant that he has not paid the required fees within the time limit under EPC Rule 104b(1), and informing him of a one month grace period within which the required fees (together with a 50% surcharge) may be paid.

Note that some PCT applicants may receive this form even when they have filed a demand for international preliminary examination before the expiration of 19 months from the priority date (thereby extending the time limit for entry into the regional phase from 21 to 31 months). This may occur where the EPO has not yet received the notification of its election. Applicants should be aware that EPO Form 1217 contains the following note concerning such cases:

"NOTE: If the present communication is despatched upon expiration of 21 months from the priority date, while the international preliminary examination under PCT Chapter II has been requested within the prescribed time limit and EP has been elected, thereby extending the time limit for entry into the regional phase before the EPO to 31 months, *applicants are invited to inform the EPO immediately* (OJ EPO 1992, 245)."

TYPES OF PROTECTION AVAILABLE IN PCT CONTRACTING STATES

Since the publication in *PCT Newsletter* No. 08/1998 of a table setting out, for each Contracting State, the types of protection which can be obtained via the PCT, several States have become bound by the PCT, and there have also been changes in the types of protection other than patents which are available in certain States.
