





Figure A.1.1 Trend in international applications




■ GROWTH RATE (%)

Top Five Classes







Top Ten Filing Origins

Legal Developments

Recent Legal Developments

- The freeze of the application of Article 14 of the Madrid Agreement (2016)
 - No longer possible to accede only to the Agreement
- Outcome of Working Group & Roundtable
 - Changes to the Common Regulations that would:
 - ■assist Offices of designated Contracting Parties (dCP's)
 - clarify tasks by the International Bureau (IB)
 - be beneficial for holders
 - Road Map

Changes to the Common Regulations (July 1, 2017)

- Introducing or changing the indication of the legal nature where the holder is a legal entity (Rule 25); MM9 form and fee of 150 CHF
- Clarification of the examination of limitations in the IB
 - Classification of limitations in international applications (Rule 12)
 - Checking that class numbers correspond for limitations presented on MM6 form (Rules 25 to 27)

Changes to the Common Regulations (November 1, 2017)

- Introducing a voluntary description of the mark in international applications and subsequent designations (Rule 9)
- Where an irregularity relating to MM18 form has not been remedied in a subsequent designation, the IB will only abandon the designation of the US (Rule 24)
- The IB will inform dCPs of changes concerning the holder's representative (Rules 3, 25 and 32)

Changes to the Common Regulations (November 1, 2017)

- It will be easier for dCPs to notify the IB of further decisions concerning the scope of protection (Rule 18ter(4))
- Where the dCPs are not able to send communications directly to the holders of IRs, the IB can forward them to the holders (new Rule 23bis)
- Two changes concerning ceasing of effect (Rule 22):
 - Office of origin can inform the IB of a final decision
 - A cancellation of an IR will also affect any IRs resulting from partial change in ownership

Changes to the Common Regulations (February 1, 2017)

■ Introducing division of IRs before the dCPs and the possible later merger of divided IRs (new Rules 27bis and 27ter)

- Practical information on the acceptable format to list indications of goods and services




