Is preservation important?

"Minutes of Science"

e.g. Artemisinin

You don't know the value of something until it's gone.

Total Annual UK Higher Education Library Spend on E-Resources (2006)

£20M (e-serials)

£20M (e and print bundled content)

£30M (other e-resources)

Total = £70Million

By 2020 80% of all material collected by a research library will be available in electronic form, 40% of this will be exclusively e.

Copyright is becoming irrelevant – licensing controls electronic journals.

100 Contracts offered to the British Library - Archiving

$$Yes = 23\%$$

Rights Issues are numerous (and intractable):

- 1. Existing legislation (if relevant) out of date. e.g. One preservation copy, permanent collection, only if not available from the publisher etc.
- 2. Too many publishers too little time.
- 3. TPMs, expiring software licences etc.
- 4. Do the publisher's own the rights? (Title transfers, only 51% of authors assign all rights to publishers, no standards re rights expressions and open access etc.)

Only legislation can its way through these issues

but

copyright law must therefore take primacy over contract law.
