In addition, he spent time as a Counsellor at the Japanese Mission to the WTO in Geneva and participated in the GATT Uruguay Round trade negotiations. Dr. Mikuriya has a degree in law from the University of Tokyo and a PhD in international relations from the University of Kent in the UK.

Mr. Xiaozhun Yi, Deputy Director General, World Trade Organization (WTO)



Mr. Yi Xiaozhun has been Deputy Director General of the World Trade Organization (WTO) since October 2013 and has extensive experience in world trade and economics, both as a senior government official and subsequently as China's ambassador to the WTO. He represented China during its WTO accession and made an important contribution to the negotiations. Prior to becoming China's ambassador to the WTO in 2011, Mr. Yi was Assistant Minister and subsequently China's Vice Minister of Commerce. In addition to his contribution to China's WTO accession, he played a leading role in negotiating numerous free trade agreements (FTAs), including the China-ASEAN agreement, China's first FTA. He also worked as a diplomat at the Chinese Embassy in the United States for more than four years from the late 1980s to the early 1990s. Mr. Yi obtained a Master's degree in Economics from Nankai University in China in 1999.
