oriGIn General Statement

Ministries,

Excellencies,

On behalf of oriGIn – the global alliance of Geographical Indications – I would like to welcome the very high number of Member States delegations mentioning Geographical Indications in their opening speech as strategic priority for the inclusive development of local producers and communities. The figures on Geographical Indications registrations in national jurisdictions around the world confirms the interest for, and potential of, this Intellectual Property right at the global level.

I would like to mention before the Assemblies of the Member States of WIPO the evidence that both the practice and the economic literature have established with respect to the contribution that Geographical Indications can give in pursuing one of the crucial objectives of our times: Sustainability. The evolution of "societal" values, consumers' perceptions and trade regulations are pushing all economic sectors – including agricultural and food value chains – to rethink their business models. One of the main challenges of today's economies is to continue to generate value – providing for the needs of a growing world population – pursuing at the same time social and environmental objectives. This represents a shift in paradigm.

In this respect, earlier this year, in cooperation with the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) of the United Nations, oriGIn has published practical guidelines to help producers to develop a roadmap towards increased sustainability in GI systems, through a bottom-up participatory approach involving local stakeholders.
