INTRODUCTION

- 1. The Management Report of BIRPI for 1969 covers the management and financial position for the year 1969. It has already been distributed to member States and should be considered an integral part of the present report.
- 2. This document contains details on the same lines as the corresponding document for the year 1968 (CCIU/VII/4).
- 3. There are three chapters in this document.
- 4. The first deals with the allocation of expenditure for the year 1969 among the six Unions (Paris, Madrid, The Hague, Nice, Lisbon and Berne).
- 5. The second chapter sets forth the situation of the Hague Union at December 31, 1969: expenditure exceeded receipts in 1969 by 3944.93 francs, and the deficit accumulated since 1963, allowing for the surpluses of 1967 and 1968, amounted to 64,449.57 francs at December 31, 1969. (See paragraph 15 of this document.)
- 6. The third chapter concerns an amount (527.80 Swiss francs) posted to profit and loss in 1969.

CHAPTER I

ALLOCATION OF THE EXPENDITURE FOR 1969 AMONG THE UNIONS

- 7. All expenditure is either specific to one Union or common to several Unions.
- 8. The Financial Rules of BIRPI define these two types of expenditure as follows: "Any expenditure incurred for the benefit of a given Union shall be considered to be a specific expenditure of that Union" (Article 7(a)). "Any expenditure incurred for the benefit of two or more Unions shall be considered to be a common expenditure" (Article 7(b)). As regards the share of each Union in the common expenditure, the Financial Regulations of BIRPI provide that "the shares shall be true and fair, based on the extent to which each Union is expected to benefit from the common expenditure" (Article 3(1))
- 9. The principles, and the percentages themselves, of the allocation of common expenditure are the result of the "opinions" expressed in November 1963 by the Interunion Coordination Committee (Paris and Berne Unions), the Committee of Directors of National Industrial Property Offices (Madrid Unions), and the meeting of the member States of the Hague Union, which opinions are based on the Report of the Financial Experts of the Paris, Berne and Madrid Unions (hereinafter called the "Experts' Report," document CCIU/I/6).
- 10. Expenditure for the year 1969 is shown under two main headings: specific expenditure (Tables A.1 to A.6) and common expenditure (Tables B.1 to B.17, in which each code is indicated) Expenditure for the previous year (1968) is indicated in order to facilitate comparison.

Consequently, the percentages applied in the 1969 accounts were increased in relation to the budget provisions, by 5% for the Berne Union and 3% for the Madrid Union, and reduced by 8% for the Paris Union.

CHAPTER II

THE HAGUE UNION DEFICIT

- 11. The Hague Union deficit amounted to 3,944.93 francs in In accordance with the decisions of the meeting of member States of the Hague Union in 1963 (see document DM/26/5, paragraph 21 and document CCIU/I/8, paragraph 15(a)), this deficit is provisionally covered by an advance, without interest, granted by the Swiss Government. If the future profits of the Hague Union do not allow these advances to be repaid, the deficits will be apportioned among the member States of the Hague Union in proportion to "the number of deposits coming from each of these States. However, the number of deposits originating in countries not party to the Additional Act of Monaco (which raised some of the fees by 400% and others by 500%) will be multiplied by four or five (as the case may be) for the purposes of computing the apportionment" (document CCIU/I/8, paragraph 15(a)).
- 12. Tables A show the minus value proportional to the deposits and prolongations registered by countries not yet party to the Additional Act of Monaco. If the following countries had been party to that Act at January 1, 1969, registrations would have produced the following additional receipts per country (4,450.-- francs), and a surplus would have appeared by the end of the accounting year (deficit: 3,944.93 francs):

Morocco 35.-Spain 4,170.-Tunisia 245.--

These amounts should thus be debited to each country, in accordance with the principles laid down by the member

States of the Hague Union, in proportion to the deposits and prolongations registered.

- 13. Table B shows the apportionment of the deficit (3,944.93 francs) among all member States of the Hague Union, in proportion to the deposits and prolongations registered.
- 14. By adding together the figures in Table B for 1963, 1964, 1965, 1966 and 1969 (apportionment of the deficits for these years among all member States) and subtracting the apportionment of the 1967 and 1968 surpluses, member States of the Hague Union would be found to owe the following amounts (the date inserted alongside the names of certain countries in the list below is the date of the respective country's accession to the Monaco Act; the letters "L.A." following the names of certain other countries mean that those countries are still bound by the 1934 London Act of the Hague Agreement):
