 - Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR) services to reduce the impact of disputes on innovation and creative processes






WIPO Arbitration and Mediation Center

- Facilitates the resolution of commercial disputes between private parties involving IP and technology, through procedures other than court litigation, including mediation and arbitration
 - Offices in Geneva and Singapore
 - Users around the world
- ADR provider <u>specialized</u> in IP and technology disputes
 - WIPO mediators, arbitrators and experts <u>experienced</u> in IP and technology able to deliver informed results efficiently
- International neutrality

What types of disputes?

- Contractual
- Non-contractual



Contractual disputes

- You have a (commercial) contract with the other party
 - licensing agreement (e.g., trademarks, patents, copyright, software)
 - research and development agreement
 - technology transfer agreement
 - IT agreement
 - distribution agreement, franchising agreement
 - film production
 - TV distribution and formats
 - art related agreement
 - joint venture agreement
 - consultancy agreement



Non-contractual disputes

- You do not have a contract with the other party
 - IP infringement (e.g., trademarks, patents, copyright, software)
 - Examples
 - You own a patent and find out that someone is using your invention without your permission
 - You own a trademark and find out that someone is using a confusingly similar identifier for its products that may compete with your products
 - You are the author of a work protected by **copyright** and find out that someone is using your work without your permission



WIPO Good Offices

- Disputes where one or both parties consider submitting the dispute to mediation or arbitration
 - No previous agreement on how to resolve the dispute
 - Infringements
 - Cases pending before the courts
- Procedural advice
- Free of charge
- Users
 - Multinational corporations and SMEs in different industries
 - Artists
 - Inventors
 - Startups
 - Research and development centers
 - Universities
 - Collecting societies



What is WIPO Mediation?

- Consensual informal procedure
- Neutral intermediary, the mediator
 - Assists the parties in reaching a settlement of their dispute
 - Based on the parties' interests
 - Does not impose a decision
- Settlement agreement has force of contract
- Mediation leaves open court or arbitration options



Why WIPO Mediation?

- Party autonomy
- Neutrality
- Time and cost
- Creative solutions
- Expertise
- Preservation of business relationships
- Confidentiality



What is WIPO Center's role?

WIPO Center can


- provide information and procedural advice
- assist parties in considering the referral of a dispute to WIPO proceedings
- assist parties in the selection of specialized mediators, arbitrators and experts
- arrange for support services, including meeting rooms

WIPO Center cannot

- provide legal advice or represent parties in dispute
- force any party to refer a dispute to or participate in WIPO proceedings

How is WIPO Mediation conducted?

- After all parties agree to refer a dispute to WIPO Mediation
 - Parties may agree on mediator
 - If they cannot agree, WIPO can assist them
 - WIPO confirms mediator's impartiality and independence
 - Parties may agree on how mediation will be conducted, in coordination with mediator
 - Mediation meetings may take place in person or remotely (e.g., telephone or videoconference)
 - Any party may step out of mediation if not interested in participating
 - Confidential



What can you achieve through WIPO Mediation?

- When parties cooperate in good faith in a mediation process
 - Win-win results
 - Collaboration opportunities
 - Creative solutions
 - Preservation of business relationships

Examples

- Negotiated licensing agreements with alleged infringers
- Access to new markets
- Trademark coexistence agreements
- Cooperation in innovation processes



And if the other party does not engage in the mediation process?

- Filing of Request for WIPO Mediation
 - May trigger settlement discussions between parties
 - May be proof of goodwill to resolve disputes out of court
 - In certain jurisdictions may be considered by court to impose fines/sanctions to other party
 - No fee payable (for Request under Article 4 of the WIPO Mediation Rules)
