INTRODUCTION

- This questionnaire aims at collecting information from Industrial Property Offices (IPOs) on formats currently in use for figurative elements of marks. The next steps would be to analyze the different standards/techniques applied by the IPOs of the various Member States and by regional organizations and to determine the feasibility of establishing a WIPO recommendation on how figurative elements of marks should be captured in electronic form.
- 2. The proposal to develop a WIPO recommendation on the above-mentioned subject matter was made in view of the fact that, with the entry into force of the Madrid Protocol and the ensuring internationalization of trademark data exchange, standards are needed to guarantee the exchange of highly standardized data in impeccable quality. (See Task No. 20 of the SCIT Task List and document SCIT/SDWG/1/2).

When displayed in an MS Windows based applications, the images are scaled to fit the client area of the display. The client areas on some of the applications that the US PTO has developed are sizable at the election of the user. This results in images scaling (without altering the aspect ratio) to whatever size the user wishes to view them at. There are opportunities for

the review of multiple images on a single screen and it is also possible to fill an entire screen with a single image.
